Abstract

AMALGAMA ART presents **Textural Codes** at The Koppel Project Exchange, an exhibition of Latin American art exploring linguistic form, signs, movement and time. The show, curated by Daniela Galan, features artists Sofia Clausse, Carmen Mariscal, Camila Quintero & Francisca Sosa Lopez.

The root of the word 'poetry' alludes to the gesture of creating or transforming thoughts into matter or forms; forms that when interpreted by someone other than their creator, have the power to recreate and evoke particular images in our brains. If that is the purpose of writing, what then, is the difference between signs in painting and those in poetry? The difference, according to philosopher Gotthold Ephraim Lessing, is time.

The narration of an image is immediate, whereas in writing it is drawn out over a beginning, a middle and an end. Many artists have questioned this difference; particularly in Latin America, where the line between image-making and writing has been used to challenge the political power of art as a universal system of signs. The work of these four Latin American women artists lets us explore the different approaches towards interpretation, perception and language, and critically confront the notions that initially come to mind.

Sofia Clausse (b. 1989) is an Argentinian artist currently undertaking a postgraduate degree at the Royal Academy Schools in London and a graduate from the Rhode Island School of Design. She is a multidisciplinary artist exploring tools, techniques and language for communication. Sofia has exhibited at the Royal Academy of Arts (London), Sadie Coles (London), national (US) and has works in many private collections around the world.

Carmen Mariscal

Carmen Mariscal (b. 1968) is a Mexican multidisciplinary artist. Born in California, she lives and works in London. She holds a Master's in Visual Arts from the Winchester School of Art, a graduate Painting degree from Central Saint Martins and a BA in Art History from the Universidad Iberoamericana (Mexico City). The recurrent themes in her work are fragility, confinement and memory. Her installation El pueblo creador was part of the Mexican Pavilion at the 2000 Universal Exposition in Hannover. Carmen was awarded 1st place in the 4th National Installation Competition in Mexico and has been selected for the Monterrey Biennial and other competitions. She has had individual and collective exhibitions in both public and private venues in Mexico, the US, Spain, France, England, Germany, the Netherlands, Luxembourg, Malaysia and Russia.









Camila Quintero (b. 1982) is a London-based Colombian artist with arts degrees from UAL Camberwell College of Arts (London) and Jorge Tadeo Lozano University (Bogota). Her works are "optical distortions" that explore the relationship between space and time. Deconstruction and optical distortion are recurrent throughout her work and refer to the response of the perceptual connection we have with our surroundings and the impact that they have on us. Her work has been selected for the UAL permanent collection 2018. In 2019, her series 'A Technicolour Odyssey', were exhibited in Selfridges Oxford Street.
